New Life

"Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds." -John 12:24

Jesus' followers were not pleased to hear predictions of doom. Who would want to hear that Jesus' death was about to happen? In the midst of this distressing news, Jesus also gives them words of hope by comparing his death to planting a seed of wheat.

In her book, *Quaker Queries for All Seasons*, Charity Kemper Sandstrom offers this question to ponder:

"Am I willing to let go of seeds, allow them to be planted, and grow to produce a harvest?"

To consider what in our lives must die in order for us to grow and allow God to plant a fresh new spirit in us is not easy. It involves a tough wrestling with our priorities and making hard choices. Knowing that Jesus was fully human, allows us to imagine that he wrestled in his last days. About his approaching death, Jesus said to his disciples, "Now I am deeply troubled. What should I say? 'Father, save me from this time'? No, for this is the reason I have come to this time.'... (John 12:27)

Strength comes from knowing that resurrection, new life, is the assured outcome of this painful process. About our lives, one friend of mine is fond of repeating, "Dying and rising, dying and rising".

In this part of the country, seasons change--thank God for that! Our spiritual lives go through seasons, too. As the church enters the Easter season, we are reminded, that death is not the end of the story. We can trust God's promises of resurrection, new life, every day.

What I learned at the Covid-19 Event



The recent March 24th *Covid-19 Information and Registration Event* was a timely opportunity to gather information.

City of Norfolk Communications Manager, Candace Schmidt, reported on Facebook that the event shared information about the COVID vaccines with over fifty people (in-person and online). They had nearly 100 individuals throughout the day come sign up and helped register hundreds more on the state database.

The event involved many community partners and volunteers including: Norfolk Area Community Foundation, Northeast Community College, Elkhorn Logan Valley Health Department (ELVHD), Mayor's Diversity Council Members, Norfolk Library and local media partners helped to get the word out.

Presenter Melanie Thompson of the Elkhorn Logan Valley Health District gave an open and honest talk about the vaccine and raised concerns that people may have. I appreciated the tone of the event and amount of information. The health department marked two major points:

-If you live or work in the Norfolk Area, we want you to get vaccinated.

-As part of your decision as whether to get vaccinated, you need to do your research by going to CDC and other trusted medical websites, and to talk with your doctor if you have concerns.

The speaker went into some depth about *variants* (what causes them and how widespread they are). She spoke about the percentages of people that may get sick after they have been fully vaccinated. No vaccine claims 100% efficacy, but all three vaccines are effective at preventing hospitalization and death. They still don't know much about how the disease is spread by those vaccinated.

As the vaccine works, it will often make people sick for a day or two after. It usually takes several hours for symptoms to appear. A person must weigh the effects of the vaccine verses the disease of Covid-19.

Emergency Response Coordinator Thompson explained the differences between the three approved vaccines made with mRNA (Moderna and Pfizer),

and the one using a Vector design (Johnson & Johnson) and the issues around both.

Right now, you don't have a choice of vaccine (perhaps one day we may), she said. The only way you may find out in advance, is to call the pharmacy to ask what brand they are currently using.

On April 1st, pharmacies will have to use the State of Nebraska Registration System accessed through <u>vaccinate.ne.gov</u> This is how everyone who wants a vaccine in Nebraska will register.

At the event, we learned how to use the registration portal, which allowed us to help register folk at the library. I had volunteered through the Mayor's Diversity Council. Both NECC and the library donated laptops and notebooks for the event. Melanie recommended people register even if they are on the fence; they can always decline the shot when they are offered time slots to receive one. Register and do your homework, she advised.

You don't need insurance or an ID to register. There are no out of pocket costs to get the vaccine. The State determines the priorities about who gets the shot. The health department will email you when they have openings. If you don't have email, you work with the State and someone will call you.

What if a person has allergies? Melanie's advice is to talk with your doctor, or pharmacy. Every nurse will talk with you before they give the shot. There are meds you don't want to be taking before receiving an injection, so talk with your doctor or pharmacy.

I was surprised to learn that children (even babies) can be registered. When there is an opening in their age group, the family will be notified.

Locally, ELVHD is aiming for 65% herd immunity; higher is better. They still don't know how long the vaccine is good for before they recommend boosters.

More takeaways: In Nebraska, all people have access to a vaccine. The sooner there is widespread vaccination, the faster we will reach herd immunity. If you would like help in registering for the vaccine, Susan Allyn or I will be glad to help you register.
