

#### **Advent Season**

Advent is a journey towards Bethlehem. May we let ourselves be drawn by the light of God made human. -Pope Francis

Advent is the four weeks before Christmas. The Latin word means "coming". During Advent, we prepare for the coming of Christ. Advent is a time of preparation for Christ's coming to us.



Advent has been celebrated by Christians as early as the 4<sup>th</sup> century. The art and mood of the Western church in the Middle Ages (5<sup>th</sup> century through the 15<sup>th</sup> century) emphasized the crucifixion rather than the resurrection, so the season had mostly a penitential feel. Purple symbolizes penitence.

Many in Christianity believed the second coming of Jesus was to be accompanied by God's final judgment of all people, when some would be given approval, and some would be punished. Showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong (being in a state of penitence) was a way to prepare oneself for Jesus second coming.

As late as the 12<sup>th</sup> century, however, the somber mood of Advent began to blur with a joyous season of looking forward to the birth of Christ.\* For churches that don't emphasize the negative, more judgmental aspect of the second coming, a penitential tone in Advent makes little sense. The modern blue color helps to distinguish Advent from Lent (a time of reflection and repentance). Blue is also the color of royalty, a color representing Jesus' mother, Mary, and the night sky that is the backdrop for the star of Bethlehem.

During Advent, we acknowledge the darkness of the world, not only as the days grow shorter, but the darkness of all that separates us from God, others, and ourselves. The darkness of war is not far from our minds these days as we receive daily reports from the Holy Land, fewer reports from Ukraine, and zero reports from the war in Sudan. Daily horrors all.

During Advent, we begin the season with hope in the darkness. As we near the time of Jesus' birth, the light grows ever brighter. Candle light reminds us of the One who brings light into the darkness—for four weeks, represented by the four candles around the Advent wreath.

#### Youth Reach Out to the Rescue Mission


