



"How very good and pleasant it is when kindred live together in unity!" - Psalm 133:1

Many hands make light work. On Saturday, May 27th, thanks to our sisters and brothers from Linaje Escogido and First Congregational, we cleaned up the church grounds in two hours!



Unity is something to lift up these days. When First Congregational and Linaje Escogido joined together in worship on December 1st, 2019, we welcomed our new friends, expressed our hopes for the future, and prayed. Our friends, also gifted musicians, played a worship song in Spanish.

Pastor Abel Garcia chose Psalm 133 to express our happiness and gratitude to God for bringing the two

churches together.

From a commentary on the Psalms, James L. May, wrote that Psalm 133 is one in a collection of short songs of ascents (Psalm 120-134). Pilgrims would sing these songs either on their way to Jerusalem, or in worship assembled as one family in Zion. Zion is another name for Jerusalem and is also the place believed to be where God lived.

In the Psalm, "good and pleasant" are words associated with unity. "Blessing" not only pointed to Zion (where God lived), it also pointed beyond Zion to the achievement of unity.*

Nebraska Annual Meeting, June 2-3, 2023 Ramada Convention Center, Columbus, NE

On June 2 and 3, I attended the Annual Meeting of the Nebraska Conference held at the Ramada Convention Center in Columbus. It was well organized and I came away energized, happy to be in ministry with so many others. Meeting in person is the best way, I believe, to keep and build 'ties that bind' us together as the United Church of Christ.

At Friday night's meal, we recognized ordination anniversaries, 5 for 5 churches (our church was named among them), church anniversaries, and those ministers who have died since we last met.

Rev. Phil Hart, Interim Conference Minister for the Iowa, Nebraska, and South Dakota Conferences (also titled our Executive Minister) reported on the state of the Nebraska Conference and the Tri-Conference.

Since arriving August or September of last year, he and the NE Boards and staff have been working hard to remedy the unsustainable budget that he inherited in 2022. As reported in October, if the budget proposed last year was allowed to continue, Phil said that the Conference would have lost 1/3 of its endowment, which was unacceptable.

The return to a balanced budget meant staff lay-offs, a creative new structure to get ministry done, and an agreement that all three conferences would agree to a Jubilee Year. Jubilee year is a concept in the Old Testament where all debt is forgiven. In the conference setting, this meant that the three conferences were allowed to not pay their portions to the Tri-conference. With all these conditions in place, the Nebraska Conference saved over \$400,000 and is back to a balanced budget.

Phil had reported at the October meeting in Sioux City, that for 5 years, the Tri-Conference was allowed to withdraw nearly \$100,000 per year from the endowment

for its operations.

Rev. Phil Hart, Interim Conference Minister for IA, NE, SD Conferences The new creative staffing model includes 3 deacons to replace the Associate Minister in Nebraska. The deacons work 5 hours per week. Our deacon for Northeast Nebraska is Elaine Miller from Southern South Dakota. She will check in with us to learn more about our church.

At a panel discussion of the NE Board members, TCM Board members, and Phil, they spoke about the work of the Conference. The Conference facilitates Search and Call, and "serves and connects" local churches to the resources of the wider United Church of Christ, be it disaster relief, mission, mental health, finances, etc.

My take away was that the Tri-Conference is still an experiment worth continuing. Phil commented how the 3 conferences cared for one another and held one another in respect. They are becoming a model around problem solving.


Phil also announced that a search committee was in place to search for a settled Conference Minister for the 3 conferences; he expects a new Conference Minister to be in place by the next annual meeting.

Phil Hart was our Illinois Interim Conference Minister when I served in Moline, IL. His gifts for preaching continue to amaze me, and his long experience as an interim conference minister has come to aid the Nebraska Conference today. Our ministry as a Tri-Conference with our brothers and sisters in Iowa and South Dakota is stronger today, thanks to him and our devoted Boards.




