Welcome





"pilgrim - a person who journeys to a sacred place for religious reasons."

On Tuesday, September 19th, I led a group of nine members and friends of First Congregational to the <u>Tri-Faith Initiative</u> campus in Omaha. Staff member, Lucas, greeted us warmly at the **Welcome Center**. Then at 10:00 a.m. we gathered next door at the **American Muslim Institute** to meet our tour guides Miriam and Abdullah. At the mosque, the towering minaret serves to call people to prayer.

In the foyer, Abdullah, assistant-Imam and youth leader, gave a brief introduction to Islam and then invited our questions. As is custom, we took off our shoes and entered the carpeted worship space. He and Miriam enjoyed answering questions as much as the group enjoyed asking them.

The congregation is made up of people representing over 30 nationalities. Abdullah enjoys the diverse mix as well as the faith they all share. He cited one study in the United States that showed 50% of Americans have never met a Muslim. Since most Muslims live in or near larger cities, far fewer people living in rural areas have ever met one. Meeting a real person face-to-face often changes a person's point of view from a negative stereotype to something positive.

After an hour, we thanked our hosts, then walked or drove to **Temple Israel.** Our guide, Mel, welcomed us and invited us to take special gift bags prepared for guests during September high holy days. Mel said that he has been a member of Temple Israel for 40 plus years. Being part of Tri-Faith has given him an opportunity to learn, grow, and respect people of other faiths.

At noon, we returned to the lower level of the Welcome Center where a catered lunch from Valentino's awaited us. Before we left the campus, a few of us stopped at Countryside Community United Church of Christ, to see the award-winning architecture.

Jane Uzzell reflected on the AMI and the Temple: "What I remember most from the American Muslim Institute is the importance of cleanliness to their entering the mosque. They wash their mouth 3 times, their hands, their feet, wipe their faces, etc—all 3 times. I would not have learned this if I wouldn't have asked about the individual little benches by faucets in the women's bathroom. And, they have low wall mounted electric blow driers to dry one's feet!"



"What I remember the most from Temple Israel is the stained-glass panels in the hall—2 sections of 7 panels, representing the 24 hours of a day—progressing from dark blues to the light of day as orange, reds, yellows, and back to the shades of blue. And, the kindness of an apple and honey—a wish for the sweetness of a new year, Rosh Hoshana."

Verletta Olson sent her thoughts about the tour:

- "The chant or calling of God to the Muslim prayer room was very moving. The sacredness of the room and how you needed to prepare your heart and body to enter into the presence of this holy place. Moses being so very important in their religion was something I didn't realize and the importance of praying and the rituals of it was so informative.
- The history of Temple Israel, again the laws given through Moses, the Holy Day's and the meaning of the ways they are celebrated and remembered.
- The simplistic beauty of the Christian sanctuary, Countryside UCC, the outreach and welcoming of anyone that comes to worship.
- The welcoming feeling of the entire campus. It was a great experience."


Rescue Mission Receives Chairs


